



Societies support PFAS recommendations

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- Congress, USDA, and the Department of Defense should provide health, financial, and technical support to PFAS-impacted farmers and ranchers.
- USEPA should protect farmers from unreasonable liability and third-party lawsuits under [CERCLA](#) (commonly known as "Superfund").
- USEPA and USDA should reduce additional PFAS contamination of agricultural land.
- Congress, USDA, and other federal agencies should coordinate and invest in PFAS research.
- USDA and other federal agencies should implement a coordinated education and risk communications strategy.

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
